

This award, BYU's most prestigious faculty award, is provided through the generosity of the Karl G. Maeser Scholarship Society. The recipient must have demonstrated clear superiority in both scholarship and teaching.

Christopher E. Crowe

ENGLISH

A BYU faculty member since 1993, Christopher E. Crowe has published 3 award-winning novels, 13 books, 85 articles, and 19 book chapters. He is the recipient of a Karl G. Maeser Excellence in Teaching Award, the Nan Osmond Grass Professorship in English, and a Karl G. Maeser Research and Creative Arts Award. He teaches undergraduate and graduate courses in young adult literature, English education, and creative writing and has served on more than 70 thesis committees. He has also spoken to thousands of students around the country about the Emmett Till case and the civil rights movement.



Ben E. Lewis Management Award

This award recognizes an administrative employee for outstanding management abilities.

Elizabeth J. Norton

PSYCHOLOGY

Elizabeth J. Norton is the critical success factor for BYU's clinical psychology PhD program. She supports 12 faculty and 40 doctoral students, making sure American Psychological Association standards are met. CIVIL AND ENVIRONMENTAL ENGINEERING

E. James Nelson is a recognized authority in the area of hydroinformatics. His work has been supported by \$13.7 million in external funding, and he has overseen award-winning research projects that have assisted developing countries in sustainably managing water resources. He is a master teacher and mentor and is a leader in his department and professional community.

Jenny Hale Pulsipher

HISTORY

Jenny Hale Pulsipher is a decorated and accomplished scholar who specializes in early American and American Indian history. Her two books have been published by the finest presses in her field, and her journal article venues represent a grand slam in her field: William and Mary Quarterly, Early American Literature, New England Quarterly, and Massachusetts Historical Review.

Samuel B. St. Clair

PLANT AND WILDLIFE SCIENCES

Samuel B. St. Clair is a biologist whose research centers on the ecological roles of desert and forest ecosystems. His team has advanced understanding of the linkages of climate and wildfire and of herbivory and biodiversity and is consistently supported by federal and state funding. St. Clair is a highly effective research mentor and champions the life-sustaining role of plants.

This award recognizes outstanding achievement in fulfilling professional faculty responsibilities and is made possible by the generosity of the Karl G. Maeser Scholarship Society.

Scott R. Burt

CHEMISTRY AND BIOCHEMISTRY

Scott R. Burt manages a state-of-the-art facility for nuclear magnetic resonance and recently upgraded the facility with \$1.8 million in new instruments. He also carries teaching and citizenship assignments comparable to those of professorial faculty, receiving excellent teaching ratings. Burt has coauthored 20 research publications and mentored hundreds of students.

Nieves Pérez Knapp

SPANISH AND PORTUGUESE

Nieves Pérez Knapp moved from Spain to teach Spanish pedagogy courses at BYU. She directs Españolandia, a country simulation that is part of the annual Foreign Language Fair, and organizes workshops and summer institutes for teachers. Knapp works in the leadership structures of international exams such as AP and Praxis and develops materials for ACTFL proficiency tests.

CHEMISTRY AND BIOCHEMISTRY

He has authored more than 200 peer-reviewed publications, and several biomedical products based on his work are currently in late-stage clinical trials. ELECTRICAL AND

Brent E. Nelson has had a distinguished career of teaching, research, and citizenship. He was the architect of the computer engineering degree, taking the lead in defining the curriculum, hiring additional faculty, and building the necessary computing infrastructure. He has served as chair of the department two separate times and has served on many college and university committees.

THEATRE AND MEDIA ARTS

Megan Sanborn Jones serves as the TMA curriculum coordinator and associate graduate coordinator. She has published work in several journals, and her second book, Contemporary Mormon Pageantry: Seeking After Our Dead, was published in 2018. Jones is a director and choreographer with credits at BYU, including Travesties and the upcoming Fiddler on the Roof.

Valerie Hegstrom

SPANISH AND PORTUGUESE

Valerie Hegstrom is the coordinator of Global Women's Studies. Her research and teaching focus on the performance of Spanish golden age plays and the recovery of female writers from the early modern period. Her current projects include studies of astrology and the embodiment of the soul in convent theater and pro-war poetry by Portuguese nuns and noblewomen.

She has been recognized twice by the U.S. Imperial Society of Teachers of Dance as America's top trainer for accreditation and certification in international-style ballroom dance technique.

Lawrence J. Green

SCHOOL OF MUSIC

Lawrence J. Green helped established the guitar program, which offers classes for major and nonmajor students. His students number in the thousands and, by rough estimate, would fill the Marriott Center. Any success he has had in teaching stems from two sources: love of the subject and love for his students. Green still plays in a working band with his wife and two of their children.

Elodie G. Petelo

FRENCH AND ITALIAN

Elodie G. Petelo has been instrumental in standardizing French grammar courses at BYU. A model colleague and peer, she has been active in the leadership of the department's French Club, the annual French Fair, and the summer French Camp and has been instrumental in helping the Utah Board of Education implement a robust and rigorous dual-language immersion program.

Brian D. Iverson

MECHANICAL ENGINEERING

In his short time at BYU, Brian D. Iverson has mentored many graduate and undergraduate students, and together they have published 35 peer-reviewed journal articles, 20 peer-reviewed conference articles, and a book. He has supported his students and research with \$2.5 million in external funding. This scholarly performance is complemented by excellence in the classroom.

Michalyn Steele

LAW SCHOOL

Michalyn Steele's pioneering work on American Indian law blends theoretical daring, analytical rigor, qualitative sensitivity, and the possibility of real-world impact. Steele has not shied away from thorny questions but has grappled with the complicated sovereignty of Native American tribes. The result is a rich body of work that has unsettled the field and established her as a leader in it.

Kristine M. Tanner

COMMUNICATION DISORDERS

Kristine M. Tanner is one of only a few researchers with a focus on laryngeal hydration and its effects on voice quality. She is widely recognized for her expertise, and she leads a multidisciplinary team of scholars at BYU and the University of Utah. Tanner involves her students as coauthors in award-winning presentations and publications and is a popular thesis mentor.

Mark K. Transtrum

PHYSICS AND ASTRONOMY

Mark K. Transtrum leads the field of "sloppy modeling," which reduces intractable systems to simple models that retain the critical features of the full system. He collaborates widely with colleagues on and off campus, and his work has attracted significant funding. Transtrum's talent, curiosity, sincere love for students, and hard work make him an excellent mentor and colleague.

This award encourages and acknowledges outstanding promise and contributions in teaching by faculty at an early stage in their careers.

Grant T. Eckstein

LINGUISTICS

Grant T. Eckstein's students and colleagues consistently rate highly his teaching and mentoring. He is widely published and has a book and nine manuscripts currently under review. In addition to his many citizenship responsibilities, he recently concluded a four-year presidential term for Intermountain TESOL. Eckstein serves on the boards of multiple journals and is a prolific reviewer.

Joshua R. Gubler

POLITICAL SCIENCE

A political psychologist and Middle East area specialist, Joshua R. Gubler studies ethnicity, nationalism, and conflict, with a focus on the Israeli-Palestinian conflict. He has led students on intensive study in the Middle East, supervised student-led survey projects in London, and taught courses in Middle East society and politics. He has been voted Professor of the Year by political science students.

Gladriel D. Shobe

LAW SCHOOL

Gladriel D. Shobe is a remarkable teacher whose devotion to her students reaches far beyond the classroom. As a result, her students voted her 1L Professor of the Year during both of her first two years at the Law School. Shobe has been a pioneer in introducing phased repetition and formative assessment into a curriculum traditionally dominated by a single all-or-nothing final exam.

Stacey J. Smith

CHEMISTRY AND BIOCHEMISTRY

In addition to managing the university's X-ray diffraction facility, Stacey J. Smith teaches large courses in general chemistry. She receives consistently strong student ratings and has had a key role in unifying the curriculum. Smith has solved structures for hundreds of crystals and coauthored more than 25 research publications, always mentoring students in the process.

David Wingate

COMPUTER SCIENCE

David Wingate's contributions as a young faculty member have included impressive research funding and publications. He is involved in deep-learning research and has helped the department create a new emphasis in data science. Seen as one of the leaders in his field, Wingate has inspired students to extend the boundaries of what is possible in machine learning.

Sponsored Research Recognition Award

This award recognizes faculty members who demonstrate outstanding achievement in scholarly activities funded by external sponsors or who give significant service in support of sponsored research and creative programs.

ate C. Arden Pope III

ECONOMICS

C. Arden Pope III is world-renowned for his seminal, cross-disciplinary research on the health effects of air pollution. He is the author or coauthor of more than 200 research papers and is one of the world's most cited researchers on the health impacts of air pollution. Pope has received many local, national, and international awards and significant sponsored research funding.



Technology Transfer Award

This award recognizes faculty members who have made significant research contributions that have led to the development of useful commercial products.

This year's award is for noise-reduction technology for vacuum-assist toilets invented by Professors Gee, Sommerfeldt, and Thomson.

PHYSICS AND ASTRONOMY

Kent L. Gee currently serves as chair of the Physics and Astronomy Department. He was named an ASA Fellow in 2015 for his contributions to jet-noise and nonlinear propagation.

Scott D. Sommerfeldt

PHYSICS AND ASTRONOMY

Scott D. Sommerfeldt is a former dean of the College of Physical and Mathematical Sciences. He was elected a Fellow of the Acoustical Society of America in 2002.

Scott L. Thomson

MECHANICAL ENGINEERING

Scott L. Thomson's interest is in the coupling of fluid motion and structural elasticity in nature. He has been involved with more than \$7 million in external research grants.


Creative Works Award
